Memoirs and autobiographies—from The Diary of Ann Frank and Gilbreth's Cheaper by the Dozen to Dillard's An American Childhood and Fuller's Don't Let's Go to the Dogs Tonight—offer a unique and intimate glimpse into others' lives. Focusing on books that tell the remembered stories of childhood and youth, this guide organizes and describes 2,500-3,000 titles in categories that reflect common reading preferences and tastes in this genre. 
New Series: Crash Course
