## **MISSION STATEMENT**

The mission of the Ontario School Library Association is to further the development of school library programs and teacher-librarianship, and to strengthen and unify the voice of teacher-librarians as curriculum leaders in Ontario.

Strong school library programs support student success by teaching students to read for breadth and understanding, research with purpose and process, build knowledge with insight and responsibility, and transform their knowledge into wisdom for a lifetime of learning.

### **ADVOCACY**

- OSLA develops resources for members to use in their own professional practice at the school and board level, such as *Information Studies, Kindergarten to Grade 12*, The Teacher-Librarian's Toolkit for Evidence-Based Practice, and Be the Change.
- OSLA strengthens and unifies the voice of teacherlibrarians as curriculum leaders in Ontario.
- OSLA is the official voice of school libraries at Ministry of Education consultations and at the Ontario Teacher's Federation Curriculum Forum.

## **CONTINUING EDUCATION**

- OSLA, through OLA's Education Institute, provides professional development by audio conference and Webcast on topics ranging from technological innovations to programs and services. There are over 150 programs offered every year to support your professional learning.
- As a contributor to the Ontario Library Association's Super Conference, OSLA offers an extensive selection of sessions designed to benefit our members. This conference attracts over 4,000 participants per year and is Canada's largest and most innovative library education event.

- School Libraries & Student Achievement in Ontario, the first Canadian research on school libraries, was funded by OLA as part of a \$100,000 commitment to research on school library effectiveness.
- OLA's Forest of Reading is the major literacy initiative in many schools, and involves many teacherlibrarians in its collective success. The programs encourage children to read, inspire authors and contribute to the Canadian publishing industry.
