What is Docs for Schools?

- Hot Docs festival for schools
- In-school & Bloor Hot Docs Cinema Screenings
- Education packages for all selections
- Free!

How does it work?

- Selections are announced in early Feb
- Schools choose up to 8 documentaries
- DVDs are sent early for preview
- Schools screen during the dates of Hot Docs
- DVDs and participation reports are returned

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School-wide festival: Why?

- D.I. creative, cutting-edge, thoughtprovoking, relevant
- Cross-curricular application
- Media literacy

PLUS...

- Raise end-of-year energy level
- Unique opportunity for students in a city where film is so important
- Exciting school-wide event

Why the library learning commons?

- LLC cross-curricular vision
- familiarity with curriculum across disciplines
- ability to collaborate and coordinate with and between departments
- ability to effectively manage the resources (creating records, check-in/out)

2 Models

Class screenings
Lunch screenings*
After school
screenings*
(*school clubs only)

Auditorium screenings Every period, every day Class sign-out available

Model A

- DVD sign-out in library
- Screenings take place in classrooms
- Tickets for lunch & after school screenings for clubs (film, eco, etc.)
- Tickets were ballots for prizes (note caveat)

PROs

- Teacher choice (all films available to all classes)
- No central coordinating

CONs

- Viewer overlap (!)
- Documentary length may not fit class/lunch time

Model B

- Venue auditorium
- Large scale intro and Q&A
- Multiple school-wide screenings per day
- Class sign up via Google Form
- DVDs still available for sign-out from library

PROs

- Cinema experience
- Better viewing quality
- Multi-level, multi-discipline
 Q&A
- Limited viewer overlap
- Minimal class disruption
- More staff involvement

CONs

- Need "buy-in" from the whole school (admin, leadership team)
- Not possible to please everyone regarding scheduling

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Key People

- Teachers (selection of films, scheduling input, facilitators, event promotion, logistics)
- Students volunteers (event promotion, AV, seating, crowd control)
- Caretaking
- Main office (bells, announcements)

Checklist:

- Put in the school calendar EARLY
- Survey teachers as soon as titles are released (Feb)
- Consult dept. heads to match films w/ courses
- Cross-reference with <u>Hot Docs' subject grid</u>
- Consult master timetable to schedule films appropriately
- ☐ Share <u>schedule</u>, film synopses & <u>curriculum material</u>
- Make preview DVDs available w/ generic library record

- ☐ Send Google Form for class sign-up (include course codes and # of students)
- Share <u>master sign-up spreadsheet</u> with staff for collaboration opportunities and capacity control
- Invite volunteers to introduce and facilitate Q&A for each film
- Consult with caretaking re set-up & tear-down
- Arrange AV team (lights, curtains, mics, projection, sound)

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- □ Prepare announcements (daily & before each film)
- Send curriculum material for EACH film to all attending class teachers (2x)
- Send reminders to attending class teachers the day before each film
- If offering club screenings at lunch and after school, prepare <u>tickets</u>.
- ☐ Track attendee #s & course codes reports & advocacy
- Offer forum for student responses (AW or Google Site)

Some Considerations

Scheduling Challenges?

- Consider proposing a special festival schedule

Sensitive Content?

- Consider smaller screenings with more intimate Q&A
- Offer a "safe zone" so students can step out

Successes?

- Approximately 1,500 students viewed 11 films in one week
- Staff and students on spare bring actual number much higher
- Now part of the annual schedule at CALC
