The Timmins Public Library has been a strong advocate of First Nation Communities Read for the past several years. In 2010, the Library began attending the annual Timmins' National Aboriginal Day celebration. At this event, I would read stories from our collection of the FNCR titles, while children made necklaces out of cereal and pasta. In 2015, I offered an additional program, this time to a local elementary school using the 2014-2015 focus on children, FNCR shortlisted titles.

In the spring of '15, the Timmins Public Library was pleased to offer St. Paul Elementary School a program based on the First Nation Communities Read Nominated Titles for 2014-2015. To this end, I collaborated with the teachers of the Grade 1, 2 & 6 classes to arrange for a series of class visits, presenting an 'interactive reading program' to pupils.

For the programming, I read the five shortlisted titles of the 2014-2015 Nominated Titles to children in the aforementioned classes. The children participated in an activity based on the material read. During these highly participatory presentations, the children were encouraged to utilize listening comprehension and critical thinking skills. Once all of the books had been read, the children had the chance to vote on their favourite book, and the results are as follows; ranked from most votes to least, and they were also given the opportunity to write about what they liked best.

- 1. Raven Brings the Light
- 2. Wild Berries
- 3. Little Chief and the Gifts of Morningstar
- 4. The Diamond Willow Walking Stick
- Moccasin Creek

Following the completion of the program, the students also participated in a webinar with Julie Flett, the recipient of the Aboriginal Literature Award and author of the 2014-2015 Selected Title, *Wild Berries*. By participating in the webinar, the children were able to ask the author/illustrator questions about her method, favourite colours/food/animals, etc. This participatory event was meant to inspire the children and to influence them to become involved with literacy as a potential career. Interaction between an author/illustrator and children is an opportunity that doesn't come along very often – especially in Timmins/Northern Ontario! This unique event will hopefully be a lasting memory for the students who participated.

In addition to the program at the school, the Timmins Public Library also hosted an "FNCR – St. Paul Gallery". In this Gallery – the drawings which the children created were displayed throughout the Children's Department for several weeks. Letters were sent home to the parents/guardians of the Grade 1 & 2 students (only these groups had an artistic component – Grade 6 responses were written). The Gallery was promoted internally and by the Timmins Public Library's

online presence. The Gallery opening also coincided with the Library's celebration of 10 years at its current location — which ensured a captive audience. In hosting the gallery, the children and their families were invited to the Library, for a specific event. This ensured that the opportunity for the Library's involvement with literacy continued beyond the program offered at the school.

As a result of the success of the interactive reading program using the First Nation Communities Read Nominated Titles, the Library has been asked to repeat the program to students at St. Paul Elementary.

The following description appeared in the Timmins Public Library's newsletter:

First Nation Communities READ (FNCR) and St. Paul Separate School

Feather Maracle Luke delivered an interactive reading program to the Grade 1, 2 and 6 students at St. Paul's. In this program, she read titles from the FNCR 2014-2015 shortlist, and discussed the stories and the artwork with the students. The younger grades were free to express their artistic side, and created beautiful masterpieces based on each story. These magnificent works of art will be on display in the Children's Department. The older students were invited to express themselves using the written word and addressed specific issues from each title. The entire program wrapped up with live chat session with Julie Flett, this year's FNCR Selected Title, and recipient of the FNCR Aboriginal Literature Award for her book, *Wild Berries / Pakwa che Menisu*. This Selected Title, as well as all of the other Nominated Titles are available for loan from the TPL.


