— AN OVERVIEW OF LLRS



An Act to appropriate a sum of Money for providing a Library for the use of the Legislative Council, and House of Assembly of this Province.

[Passed 1st April, 1816.]

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN,

Preamble.

WHEREAS, it is expedient to make Provision for the Purchase of Books for the use of the Legislative Council, and House of Assembly of this Province, We, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Upper Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, beseech your Majesty, that it may be enacted, and be it enacted, by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly, of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled, by virtue of, and under the authority of an Act, passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled, "an Act to repeal certain parts of an Act, passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled, an Act for making more effectual Provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province," and by the authority of the same, That from and out of the Rates and Duties, raised, levied and collected, or hereafter to be raised, levied and collected, to and for the public uses of this Province, and in the hands of the Receiver General thereof unappropriated, there be granted to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, the sum of eight hundred Pounds, which said sum of eight hundred pounds, shall be appropriated, applied and disposed of in purchasing Books and Maps, for the use of the Legislative Council, and House of Assembly, of this Province.

£800 to be appropriated to purchase Books and Maps.

The said sum to be paid by the Recr. Genl. or any one of the Com.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the said sum of eight hundred pounds as aforesaid, shall be paid by the Receiver General of this Province, to any one of the Commissioners herein-after appointed, in discharge of such War-

information specialists, but it is clear to us that the Library should be one of the best in the country, in terms of professional attainments and experience; and that, to provide an expanded research service, which we are recommending be established as soon as possible, additional senior staff must also be hired in the near future.


Research Goals for the Library

In library circles there has been an argument for decades over the degree to which a library should be a passive, though highly organized, repository, and how much it should be active in developing services that its patrons are not accustomed to, or have not thought about. Further, there can be considerable disagreement in an institution where partisanship is intrinsic, as to the propriety of a forceful library staff canvassing politicians and caucuses in terms of information and services.

We have outlined our reasoning on a new and more independent status for the Legislative Library, and have urged that it be oriented toward

- Keep it classic and simple, avoid trends or programs that rotate
- Stick to the core values of what your library can do for them
- Highlight your abilities, not just your assets
- Consider what you offer that is relevant to your client's needs

QUICK TOUR TIPS

- Updated version created in response to an increasing number of clients dropping in
- One-stop map and information sheet for library staff
- Designed to be used at a moment's notice
- Includes a map with numbers for various points of interest
- Everyone using the same handout allows for a consistent experience for our clients

QUICK TOUR GUIDE (2018)

This guide is designed for walk-ins who want a quick tour of the library

It should take 5-10 minutes, depending on client's level of interest

Services

Customized Research

- We answer MPP and staff (including constituency offices) research and information questions

- Since Confederation there has only been one fire – the fire of **1909**
- The fire destroyed the west wing of the Main Building, and with it, the Library
- A small number of books were saved

Fun Facts about Collection

Old items include:

- Beeswax impression of the Great Seal of Upper Canada, in use between 1792 and 1817
- Upper Canada House of Assembly Journal, First Parliament, First Session from 1792
- The 1st Upper Canada Gazette from April 18, 1793

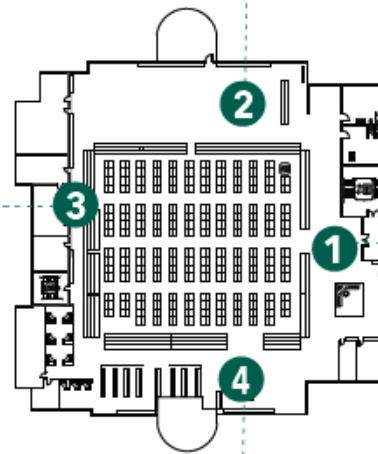

Definition

Hansard is the substantial verbatim record of daily proceedings of the House and its Committees.

Types of Hansard

Instant Draft

- Is available through the Member's Portal and the Assembly Intranet
- About 1 hour time lag for House Hansard
- No specific time lag for Committee Hansard
- When the House is in session, House Hansard takes precedence

House

- Available electronically on the Assembly website going back to October 1975
- 1945-1980 is available through the Internet Archive [go to <https://archive.org>, use search terms "Official report of debates (Hansard)"]

Committee Transcripts

- Available electronically on Assembly website going back to 1990
- Committee Hansard is listed by parliament and then alphabetically by committee name
- HTML and PDF versions are available for more recent years (HTML only for earlier years)

Indexes (House and Committee)

Current Session

- Draft House and Committee indexes (Subject or Speaker) are available on the Assembly website
- House index usually has a skeletal entry added within 48 hours (check last modified date)
- Page number references to debates are hyperlinked
- Can target types of business, such as oral questions or petitions, in the Speaker index

Previous Sessions

- Previous House and Committee indexes
- go back to Oct. 2007 (39th Parl., 1st Sess.) on the Assembly website
- Page numbers for these indexes are hyperlinked

Advanced Searching

- Search engine for House Hansard only (can try to search Committee Hansard using Google)
- Search fields include—keyword, session, date, range, type of business, topic and speaker
- Search syntax—phrase searching^{***}. Truncation*, case insensitive, search with and without punctuation, Boolean operators AND, OR, NOT, NEAR—within 50 words of each search term

Bill-Specific Hansard

If you are looking for the debates for a specific bill:

- On the Assembly website, go to the webpage for the Bill and click on the Debates tab

How an Ontario Bill Becomes Law

What is a Bill?

A bill is an idea written in legal language and presented for consideration to the Legislative Assembly by a Member of Provincial Parliament (MPP). It may be a proposal to make a new law or laws, or a proposal to change existing laws. A bill must pass through all the stages prescribed by the Legislature in order to become Ontario law.

In Ontario, there are three kinds of public bills which are general in application:

Government Bills – Government Bills are introduced by Cabinet Ministers.

Private Members' Public Bills – Private Members' Public Bills are introduced by Members who are not Ministers.

Committee Bills – Committee Bills are introduced by the Chairs of certain Standing Committees.

The Legislative Assembly also considers **Private Bills**, which are introduced by a Member who is not a Minister. Private Bills are bills that, if passed by the Assembly, allow a particular person or group of persons an exemption from the general law, or provide for something that cannot be obtained under the general law.

Unlike Public Bills, which pertain to matters of public policy and are initiated by Cabinet Ministers or private members, Private Bills originate with a municipality, company or individual seeking a special power or exemption.

Example of an Ontario Bill

Figure 1 on page 5 depicts the cover of a co-sponsored bill that was introduced on March 30, 2010 and received Royal Assent on May 18, 2010. Note that the title on the page is the "long

title". The short title, or the title most often used to refer to the bill, is provided in its final clause.

Figures 2 and 3 on page 6 are the English versions of Bill 19's *Explanatory Note* and its text.

Ontario bills are published in print and electronically in htm and pdf formats. They appear with English and French text side-by-side on each page. First reading bills usually are posted within two days of introduction and amended bills are posted after being reported to the House. The amended versions show the changes that were made. When a bill has received Royal Assent it is posted in its final version.

All versions of Ontario bills from 1995 onwards are available on the [Bills and Lawmaking](#) page on the Assembly's website. Pre-1995 bills are available in public and university libraries.

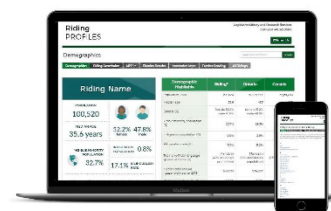
